Thieves Exchange (Holiday Party) Game Rules

Each person who wants to participate needs to bring a wrapped gift worth at least \$15. Each person will draw a number.

The game begins with the person who has number #1. That person will select one of the wrapped gifts, and then open it for all to see (gifts must remain in plain sight until the end of the game)

The person with number #2 then takes their turn. They have a choice: they may either chose one of the remaining wrapped gifts and open it (as did #1), or they may choose to "steal" #1's gift from them. In the latter case, #1 then has to choose a new wrapped gift.

The player with number #3 then begins with the same choice that #2 had: choose a wrapped gift, or steal one of the unwrapped gifts from someone who has already taken their turn.

This pattern continues until all players have a gift.

The following additional rules apply: first, a gift may only be stolen once in a turn. In the above, if #3 were to steal #1's gift, and #1 were to then steal #2' gift, #2 has to choose one of the wrapped presents; he or she can not steal #3's gift.

In addition to only being stolen once in a turn, a gift may only be stolen 3 times in total. The third time a gift is stolen, it is said to be "frozen." It belongs to the person who stole it the last time. To track this, we will have stickers which will be placed on a gift each time it is stolen. A gift with three stickers is frozen. ***

URAC's VE Corner ... Gary N6HMR

Following a heavily attended First Saturday Breakfast (was there even one empty place setting?), David Reid, Bill Carter and I proctored three Commercial exams at the LA Maritime Museum.

Already on the VE team, URAC's own John Rogers AG6VO is on his way to qualifying as a Commercial Examiner (CE) by passing Element 1 for his MROP. At present, to become a CE one must have a Commercial License which required Element 3 ... either GROL (1 & 3) or GMDSS-Maintainer (1, 3 & 9).

Of the other two applicants, one upgraded from MROP to GROL and the other added both GMDSS licenses by passing Elements 7 and 9.

If you're considering acquiring a Commercial license and looking for current study material, depending upon which Element, your "current" book may be from 2 to 20 years old. Elements 1, 3 and 8 were last revised in 2009, Elements 7 and 9 in 2013, and Element 6 in 1994 (there are no plans to revise this Element). Elements 5, T3 and T4 are no longer administered.

As we approach the new year, if you're interested in passing your Extra Class license, know that the exam pool takes affect after June; so you have six months with the current study material.

For Saturday's exam, thanks to David and Bill for your time after the breakfast, and to Marifrances for use of the museum facilities.

<u>Kids are Not the Future of Ham Radio ...</u> <u>... Bob Witte KONR</u>

You've heard it a million times: our kids are the future. That statement gets applied to almost everything, including amateur radio. How can you argue with an obvious fact like that?


But I am starting to think it is incorrect.


We've had really good success on creating new hams of all ages in our Technician License Class (at the Tri-Lakes Monument Radio Association). We've been doing this for a while now and I think I am seeing a pattern emerge. We've been able to attract middle schoolers to the class and help them get their ham radio license. I've talked to many of them on the air. They've helped out with public service events. They seem to have fun playing with radios.

Then this thing called high school happens. The high school phase in the US is filled with tons of stuff to do: studying, homework, AP classes, science competitions, sports, dating, movies, driving and after school jobs. Way too much stuff. Ham radio starts to take a backseat to these normal high school activities. Then we don't see the kids at the radio club meetings or chatting on the local repeater because they are busy doing other things. Have we lost them forever? Not sure.

High school is often followed by college which has its own set of challenges: a totally new environment, away from home, a new set of people, new studies, etc. There might be a ham radio club on campus but maybe not. If a kid is not off to college they are (hopefully) out doing something to establish themselves in this world. Eventually they emerge on the other side, get a job, get themselves established, sometimes with a spouse and maybe a kid or two. By this time they are 25 to 30 years old, depending on the individual.

I recently posted about the demographics of our students in the Tech License Class (http://www.k0nr.com/wordpress/2015/10/where-are-the-new-technicians-coming-from/). The chart below shows the age distribution of our students from our most recent class. Hmmm, clearly most of our students are





30 or older. (Sorry, we have not collected age data with finer resolution.) This particular class is light on the under 18 crowd...sometimes we have a clump of kids in the mix.

For whatever reason, it seems most people find themselves in a situation as an adult that causes them to say "I want to get my ham radio license." When asked why they want to get their ham license, the top response is always emergency/disaster communications, followed by backcountry communications, pursuing electronics as a hobby and learning about radio communications. I suspect that starting to be established in a community and having some disposable income also play a role.

My hypothesis is that the most effective way of growing a vibrant ham radio community is to target adults ages 25 to 40.

This age range is more equipped and ready to be ham radio operators and are still young enough that they will be around for a while. Of course, we still want to work with all age groups, including kids and retirees. We've all seen very young hams get the bug for ham radio early and carry it throughout their life. And we also see plenty of older folks get interested in the hobby as they approach or enter retirement. We don't want to miss out on either of those groups.

So that's my read on the situation. I've got some data to support my theory but I can't really prove it. What do you think? What are you seeing in your ham radio community?
